## Why are publishers choosing federated access management?

---

- Improved user experience through single sign-on and personalisation
- More secure than other systems
- Provides more choice and flexibility
- Clause in licence agreements re: joining the UK federation
- Costs
  - joining the federation and using open source software free at point of use
  - economies of scale through using same standards-based technology for other countries



- Federations in operation:
  - Croatia, Finland, France, Germany, Netherlands, Norway, Switzerland, UK, USA
- Federations in development or testing:
  - Australia, Belgium, Denmark, New Zealand, Spain, Sweden
- In the pipeline: Japan

- Funding Athens and Federation Gateways until 31 July 2008
- Providing support through the JISC Access Management Outreach Team
- Providing additional support for smaller publishers
- Providing events, briefing papers and information about third party providers for technical solutions and support
- Ensuring the services hosted by Mimas, Edina, BUFVC and other JISC services are federation-compliant
- Netskills training for service providers

- JISC requesting publishers to confirm access management arrangements they will be providing from 1<sup>st</sup> August 2008 eg. Athens, Shibboleth, IP address, IP-proxy, separate username and password

## Institutions using Athens from 1<sup>st</sup> August

---

- Institutions using Athens from 1<sup>st</sup> August will still be able to access Federation-protected resources
- Users select “Eduserv Athens” from the WAYF and log-on using their Athens username and password
- Caveats:
  - provides limited functionality
  - seek assurance from Eduserv that they will remain Federation-compliant

## Institutions using Federation-compliant technologies from 1<sup>st</sup> August

---

- Institutions that have chosen the OpenAthens product can access Athens only protected resources through their subscription
- Institutions using other Federation-compliant technologies from 1<sup>st</sup> August can choose to pay a subscription to Eduserv for access to Athens only protected resources
- Very few resources are affected by this and most also provide access via IP address
- JISC is working with these resource providers to adopt federated access management and join the UK federation

- Discussions with all publishers with JISC or Nesli2 licence agreement
- 47 service providers (including 22 publishers) have joined
- Identifying smaller publishers of importance to UK education and research
- Briefing day for JISC funded services, Sept 2007 and ongoing support for joining the UK federation
- UKSG Conference, 7 – 9 April, Torquay: opportunity to meet with publishers to discuss joining the UK federation

## Future developments: Federation agreements

---

- JISC study to investigate the feasibility of cross-jurisdiction common access management federation agreements.
  - No legal impediment to development of common agreements
  - Insignificant content and structural differences between national federation agreements and very few 'active' clauses
  - Standardising agreements would be beneficial to both federations and members
  - Unlikely to be used in short-term due to other priorities eg. uptake of membership
